Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Does Hinduism support organ and tissue donation?

A: There are no references to organ and tissue donation in Hindu scriptures. Hindu beliefs and principles support organ and tissue donation. The philosophy of Yajna, which promotes giving to others, is one of the highest principles of the Vedas. A true act of Yajna would be giving someone the gift of life by donating organs and tissues.

Q: Does organ donation affect Hindu funeral and burial practices?

A: The body is treated with the utmost respect during the organ and tissue donation process. The family will be able to hold traditional Hindu funeral practices after the donation process has occurred.

Q: Does organ donation have an impact on the soul going to the next life?

A: Life after death is a strong belief for Hindus and is an ongoing process of rebirth. The law of karma decides which way the soul will go in the next life.

Q: How does the Hindu perspective on death impact organ and donation?

A: Most Hindus believe that when the soul has departed at the time of death, the body is then separated from its earthly purpose. The body is not re-incarnated and there is nothing to impede the process of donating organs and tissues at the time of death.
